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
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# **ONLY RAIN DOWN THE DRAIN**

Kate Myers' Independent Project Attracts Several Collaborators

What started off as a simple idea to paint murals on storm drains to educate passersby on the impact the drains have on the river that flows through Apollo quickly exploded into a collaboration that will gain regional, if not statewide, recognition for Junior Kate Myers.

In the fall of 2020 Kate's Gifted Support Teacher, Danielle White, reached out to the Education Foundation for assistance, since the Foundation had completed the large-scale mural in

After contacting ArtsPath, a regional arts-in-education program in partnership with the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts and administered through IUP, it was determined that the project fit the criteria for an Artist-In-Residence program.

The project quickly gained support from the Armstrong Conservation District and Apollo Borough.

The Conservation District had contacted Alleghenv Ridge Corporation, a not-for-profit organization charged with the restoration and development of the historic, cultural, and natural resources of the Allegheny Ridge Heritage Area, to see if there were any municipalities that were considering storm drain murals to satisfy MS4 requirements for their storm water separation projects.


Because of their involvement with the Apollo mural project, Allegheny Ridge contacted the Foundation and was delighted to find that a storm drain mural project was already in the planning stages.

Apollo Borough eagerly gave Kate access to the drains for her project. She

also received permission from Roaring Run Watershed Association to place an educational sign at the trailhead in Kiski Township and asked the Apollo Area Historical Society to include the murals on their Walking Tour of Apollo interactive map. Several of the murals were on display at Apollo's May Daze event.

Kate solicited the help of the students in her homeroom and Dan Barrett's high school art classes to design and paint the murals.

The Armstrong Conservation District plans to use the project as a template to share with other municipalities who must meet the MCM1 requirement for their MS4 projects.

## STEM MEETS LANGUAGE ARTS IN READ 180 CLASSROOM

The Foundation loved Ashley Iones' "Good Clean Learning" Innovative Projects grant, not only for its relevancy during a pandemic, but for its very innovative way to insert STEM into a reading lesson.

The first unit in Jones' Read 180 Curriculum is titled Contagion and features articles from past pandemics with a career focus on epidemiologists. Jones' grant allowed her to purchase a MIST Deluxe Glo Germ Kit that contained everything needed to present infection control demonstrations.

The students practiced hand washing, demonstrated how one infected object can spread germs to an entire class, learned how masks function as source control, and practiced washing surfaces. The students were amazed at how many germs they left behind after they washed their hands and how far a sneeze or a

cough can go.

Celina St. Antoine: "The things that I liked about the germs experiment was that we got to see and experience how gross the germs are when we sneeze and not wash our hands. I love the germ experiment because it was great for the kids to learn how disgusting germs are."

Jack Delo: "It was hard to get 100% of the powder off and it spread super easily around the room like real germs. It even got in areas nobody was at!"

Aliyah Crowell: "My favorite part about the project was when you passed the papers back and the germs (were) spread (studentto-student) by the paper. And using the black light on our hands. I thought that was
